

Reading Group Questions for Shadow Sister

Author Heather Gilbert describes *Shadow Sister* as the story of two sisters: Jenna, who ran away from home to escape her past, and Sarah, who stayed home and forgot who she really was. Which sister do you most identify with?

On the surface, Jenna and Sarah couldn't be more different. In what ways are they similar?

What role does Tomaso play in the sisters' lives? How is it different for each of them?

Symbolism plays a big part in *Shadow Sister*. What is the significance of the carved mahogany box? Jenna's silver charm bracelet? The growing of grapes?

As an adult with a robust and personal faith in Jesus Christ, Sarah looks back on her childhood and calls Jesus the milquetoast God of her Sunday school upbringing. Can you relate to this view? How does Sarah's faith continue to grow throughout the course of the story?

What does Jenna mean when she says, "I met Jesus in Bolivia. Or He met me. Or both."

Why do you think Sarah develops such an immediate rapport with Sofia?

What do you think of the belief that a spirit lingers a while on earth before departing? Have you, or anyone you know, ever experienced something similar to what Sarah did after a loved-one's passing?

Tomaso says to Sarah, "Too often we see only what we expect to see and become blind to everything else." How do we see this theme played out throughout the book?

Jenna makes sense of the world through words, Sarah through art. How do you make sense of your world?


Do you think a foreign presence like La Fuente is right to go into places like Magdalena and try to do things differently? Why or why not?

At what point does Sarah realize she and Jenna have made peace with each other?

What is the truth that finally sets Sarah free?

What do you think the future holds for Sarah and Chase? For Sarah and Harrison? For Jonas? For Sofia?

Who is the shadow sister—Sarah or Jenna?

Working on her father's vineyard allows Sarah Lanning to bury memories of a lost love and a career that might have been. But then her fractured family receives word that her estranged sister, Jenna, is dead, leaving behind an unexpected request: that Sarah travel to Bolivia to scatter her ashes.
